

All are welcome and you receive a free model on arrival to get you started.








Book Review: 1989 The Berlin Wall: My Part In Its Downfall

Black History Month

It has received official recognition from governments in the United States and Canada, and more recently has been observed in Ireland and the United Kingdom. It began as a way of remembering important people and events in the history of the African diaspora. It is celebrated in February in the United States and Canada,

while in Ireland and the United Kingdom it is observed in October.

We have chosen to focus our competition on reading after we discovered that this year in America there was a wideranging ban on books in a southern Pennsylvania school district.

The ban, which was implemented last October by the Central York school board, focused almost entirely on titles by or about people of colour, with a lengthy list of works by acclaimed authors including Jacqueline Woodson, Ileoma Oluo and Ibram X Kendi all prohibited.

Teachers were informed that titles including Malala Yousafzai's autobiography and children's books about Rosa Parks and Martin Luther King Jr were also banned, along with articles and videos, including a documentary about the writing of James Baldwin.

Thankfully, last month, the school board voted unanimously to reinstate the list of books immediately.

We think it is important to think carefully about what happened and get reading some amazing literature.

We have already shared some of our recommendations with students in assembly and tutor time.





'Cycle 2 School'



Hereford Mappa Mundi

Hereford Mappa Mundi, is one of the world's unique medieval treasures. Measuring 1.59 x 1.34 metres (5'2" by 4'4"), the map is constructed on a single sheet of vellum (calf skin). Scholars believe it was made around the year 1300 and shows the history, geography and destiny of humanity as it was understood in Christian Europe in the late thirteenth and early fourteenth centuries.

The inhabited part of the world as it was known then, roughly equivalent to Europe, Asia and North Africa, is mapped within a Christian framework. Jerusalem is in the centre, and east is at the top. East, where the sun rises, was where medieval Christians looked for the second coming of Christ. The British Isles is at the bottom on the left.

Mappa Mundi Exploration | Mappa Mundi Hereford Labyrinth. In Greek mythology the Cretan labyrinth was built by Daedalus to contain the Minotaur, a bull-headed, maneating monster. The myth tells how King Minos pledged to appease the Minotaur's voracious appetite by regular offerings of seven young men and women, but Theseus entered the labyrinth and heroically slayed the monster.

Year 8 Globe Trip






Turing House Friends
