




History Success

Well done to Y13 Historians for some excellent revision presentations in their history class.






STEM Club

Holocaust Memorial Day

Holocaust Memorial Day is the day for everyone to remember the millions of people murdered in the Holocaust, under Nazi Persecution, and in the genocides which followed in Cambodia, Rwanda, Bosnia, and Darfur. This week some of our Year 7 and Year 9 students were fortunate to have the opportunity to hear second generation Holocaust survivors share their testimony in their History lessons.

Visiting our Year 7 students, Sandra Miller told the story of how her Polish born mother survived the Holocaust escaping from the Warsaw Ghetto, hiding in a forest, being imprisoned, and then taking on the identity of a Polish girl and working on a farm in Germany as a slave labourer.

It was invaluable for our students to meet Sandra, and also Seymour Kelly, and we are very grateful that they gave up their time to speak with us.

Middlesex Schools Cross Country Championships



Well done to Millie C in Year 10 and Eleanor S in year 7 who represented Richmond in the Middlesex Cross Country Championships this week, having qualified through their placement in the borough stages of the competition last term. The running event took place at Harrow School and was not short of stiff competition. Both Turing House students represented the school and the borough beautifully and competed well in their respective races. Eleanor competed against Y7 girls over

2.5km. The race was held at Harrow School, with the course winding its way through muddy fields. Eleanor's race was very tight but managed to sprint to the line and claim 3rd place. This was an outstanding achievement and means that she has qualified to represent Middlesex at the Southern Championships. Millie competed against Y10 and Y11 girls over 3.3km, finishing in 14th – a hugely impressive result! Well done, Millie and Eleanor!

We are also hugely proud of Mr Evans who was crowned county champion for Middlesex recently. Mr Evans is incredibly modest about this achievement, but this is huge!!

Burns Price Foundation

The Burns Foundation supports projects that encourage people to work together for equality, to heal divisions caused by gender, ethnicity, religion or poverty. The projects must be for the public benefit and have a community-enhancing purpose. They must benefit other people as well as the person or group applying. As a guide, successful applications are likely to focus on reparation, reconciliation, peace building, restorative justice or care for the local environment.

If any members of our community are interested here are a few important details:-

- We prefer applications from groups, but will also fund individual projects
- Projects can be anywhere in the world and can be big or small, but the applicant(s) must be in the UK, and all projects must be supported and supervised by an adult.
- Applications will be considered by the Trustees four times a year. When an application is received, we will let you know when it is to be considered.
- Grants will be made from £100 to a maximum of £5,000. This should cover the full project cost, as follow-up grants will only be made in exceptional circumstances.
