

Message from Mr O'Sullivan

This week the senior staff and I have spent some time looking at reading data across KS3. We then spent a day reviewing our English department as part of our internal audit process. It was delightful to see the high-quality teaching and learning taking place in these lessons, the engagement of the students and the expertise of the staff delivering excellent lessons. The department is expertly led by Miss Andrews. It was also fascinating hearing about the books that students were reading outside of their lessons. Reading is a gateway to everything; it increases vocabulary, develops cultural capital and in most cases is good for mental health. People who read regularly will have more doors open to them in later life. The link between low literacy or reading levels, and criminal behaviour or incarceration remains high.





Remembering the Holocaust


marks 84 Today years since the first Kindertransport train arrived at Harwich train station carrying 200 Jewish children. They arrived from a Jewish orphanage in Berlin that had been destroyed just a few weeks earlier during Kristallnacht.

Today, we remember those children, separated from their families and everything they knew; and we remember their parents - most of whom were murdered in the Holocaust. As we remember, we pledge to continue to educate about the horrors of the Holocaust and its lessons.

In January, we have arranged for all Turing House students to hear from a second generation survivor of the Holocaust who will tell the story of their family members. More details will follow in the New Year.

Change to South Western Railway

New timetable from 11th December 2022

As you may already be aware, South Western Railway will be introducing a new timetable from 11th December 2022. As was announced earlier in the year this will largely be consistent with the current timetable, although with some optimisations where possible. Examples are included in the press release below, which was issued last month.

The optimisation and improvement being done means that the timings of many services will change from the 11th December (for example departing a station slightly earlier or later than currently). We are carrying out a customer awareness campaign to make sure people are aware of the changes and would encourage everyone to check train times before traveling. The new timetable is now live and available in our journey planner as well as PDF timetables on our website.
