Message from Mrs Collins

- Please remind your child of the dangers of open water and the many hidden risks, even for strong swimmers.


We are delighted for our students and hope that they can all look forward to a very well-earned rest and a safe summer holiday.

End Period Poverty

Statistics suggest that more than 52% of teenagers miss school or college due to their period, with 1 in 14 citing the fact that they either cannot afford or do not have access to sanitary products. At Turing House, we believe that everyone should have fair access to their education, and we want to do everything we possibly can to ensure barriers such as these are removed.

Following on from Mrs Curtis' assembly on Period Poverty earlier this term, we are further promoting free access to sanitary products through the school, however, we would like our students to inform us as to what products they would like us to provide. The poster below has recently been displayed on the back of toilet doors with a QR code, through which students can suggest sanitary products for us to purchase, as well as request a 'Period Pack', should they require it. Please encourage your child to use the facility if necessary, so that we can support their learning further.
