

## Message from Mr O'Sullivan

In summary Munira would like 'a dedicated qualified mental health practitioner in every school - primary and secondary - giving every child in school access to care and support from the moment they start needing it.' I personally think this would be amazing. Staff at Turing House, particularly the pastoral team and PLUS, do an amazing job supporting our young people but to have this would be fantastic. In other news I have been working closely with Lucy MacArthur from our Local Authority. Ruth has worked tirelessly to launch a new borough-wide day called 'Safe'. Substance Advice For Everyone (SAFE) Day is Monday March 4. This is a local initiative to tackle

substance use by getting ALL secondary schools to deliver the same resources to ALL children - and importantly their families/carers at home- on the same day. More details on this will

follow shortly. However, at its heart is to reduce the number of admissions to Kingston and West Middlesex of Richmond children due to drug related issues. Richmond and Kingston have the highest statistics in London! This has to change.

This coordinated approach is important because all schools are in this together and the impact of every child and every parent/carer receiving this on the same day will be big across two boroughs. The independent schools are also delivering this project.

Moving to more national news, you will have seen the information currently circulating about the drop in MMR vaccines. The Independent recently stated 'Almost 3.5 million under 16s are at risk of catching measles, mumps, and rubella (MMR), Government has warned as parents were urged to book their children in for jabs'. While we have no cases at THS I feel it's important to share this information in order to protect students in the long run. ## Parents' E-Safety Training Event

I would like to draw your attention to an excellent event delivered by Smoothwall that has been put on specifically for the five schools in the Russell Education Trust. Smoothwall are the company that run our monitoring and filtering software. Their service is incredibly robust to the point of recording student keystrokes even before they press enter. This enables us to support if a child is in distress but also allows us to monitor inappropriate use of the network. On **Tuesday 30**<sup>th</sup> **January at 7:30pm** there

In recognition of Holocaust Memorial Day, Year 7 were given a talk by Vivienne Cato from Generation 2 Generation.

Vivienne is the daughter of Eva Cato, who was born in Czechoslovakia 1926. Growing up, Eva witnessed the growth of antisemitism towards her small Jewish community. After her aunt was transported to Auschwitz, Eva and her mother illegally escaped to Budapest, living under false identities. They survived the siege of Budapest by sheltering in a basement for weeks with no food.

After the war, Eva returned to Slovakia to study medicine, but was forced to leave by the Communist Regime, and immigrated to the UK.

Vivienne was an excellent speaker and engaged students with the important story of her mother. Our Year 7s asked interesting questions and learnt a lot from the talk.
