
With our Year 11 students starting their official exam period next week, and Year 13 students the week after, we wish them all the very best of luck and we hope all their hard work pays off.

Over the course of the trip students were able to gain first-hand experience of the geographical enquiry process, which included getting to grips with the wide range of fieldwork strategies that are used to collect primary data.

We spent time discussing the way in which we collect our data to ensure it is reliable, accurate and precise. Students then worked in the evenings to present their data using a range of graphs and GIS.


Fieldwork opportunities linked to all aspects of the course and included an ecosystem study, a changing places study and an investigation into coastal management.

Last week, 30 Year 9 students were selected to attend a St. Mary's University talk on the Rwandan Genocide. These students were chosen by their history teachers due to their consistent hard work over the year in lessons.

Students were shown around parts of the university by alumnae Ms Riglin and Mrs Lamb. They then attended the talk and Q+A session from a survivor of the genocide. This was incredibly moving and thought provoking, and really helped students to learn about the event through a personal story. This built on their Term 3 unit studying genocides in the 20th Century.

Our students represented the school excellently and were able to gain an understanding of what university life is like!


