English Literary Review

Nettles: A Strikingly Sharp Story, reviewed by Casper W, Year 12

The renowned Vernon Scannell managed to gracefully evoke a sense of responsibility with his poem 'Nettles'. It recalls a memory of a parent finding his son injured from falling into a bed of nettles, with the parent taking measures to ensure this event does not happen again, however to no avail.

What was particularly poignant about this poem is that it reveals the true nature of parenthood. The child is injured due to lack of knowledge around the danger and even when the parent gets rid of the problem, it only comes back, with the likelihood of his son being injured again being very high. This situation can apply to any danger, offering a unique overall perspective on the idea of responsibility. Nettles' rhyme scheme follows a more traditional pattern, almost telling the tale like a fairytale, making it highly pleasant to follow. With the final line 'My son would often feel sharp wounds again' it strikes me as meaning that the responsibility of parents for their children is perpetual, which resonates deeply with many parents across the planet.

With that being said, there's a few things I would like to address around the cons of this poem: personally, I see poems to be like puzzles, and the wartime themes of Nettles are far too rudimentary and obvious to me. Poets tend to hide themes within the lines of their poems, however the concept of war sticks out like a sore thumb, as we say. As well as this, the themes, given the context, are rather bleak. Considering that this is based around raising a kid, the theme can also be considered a bit of a stretch to some extent. Generally, the use of simple words and phrases are

sweet and suit the text, but some could see it as shallow and not really letting the reader challenge themself.

Overall, 'Nettles' is very allegorical when you read between the lines, leaving us with a new perspective on parenting, though some can consider it to be bleak. This poem does exceptionally well at engaging with the reader, earning it a 9/10.




Year 12 Art
