#### Year 9 trip to Imperial War Museum

On Wednesday, all of Year 9 took an educational trip to the Imperial War Museum. It was an incredibly informative experience, filled with fascinating insights into the history of warfare. We explored three key galleries: the World War I gallery, the World War II gallery, and an exhibition on modern warfare. These exhibits showcased both the remarkable advancements in military technology and the devastating impacts of war.


