The Evaluation Game

Upon returning to school, Y11s in Mr Stevens' class participated in 'The Evaluation Game', an activity designed to help students investigate and evaluate texts in an interactive way.

In this game, students formed different departments within a fictional police station, each with a unique mission. The teams were as follows:

- Team Plot: Investigated the sequence of events in the story.
- Team Characterisation: Examined the characters and their development.
- Team Setting: Explored the time and place where the story happened.
- Team Ideas: Identified the main ideas and messages.
- Team Theme: Uncovered the underlying themes.
- Team Event: Focused on climactic moment of the text.

Students worked in groups to interrogate their chosen topics within a text extract. Team captains then shared their findings with other captains before reporting back to their teams. Finally, each team 'wrote a report' on their findings (in other words, an essay...).
