

## Macbeth screening at The Exchange

The Exchange in Twickenham are screening a new production of Shakespeare's Macbeth on Wednesday 5<sup>th</sup> February, filmed live at the Donmar Warehouse in London. Students in Years 10 and 11 may be interested in attending. This is a brand-new critically acclaimed production, starring David Tennant ('simply hypnotic'  $\star \star \star \star$  The Times), playing the role of Macbeth for the first time, and Cush Jumbo ('remarkably compelling'  $\star \star \star \star$  Theatre Weekly) as Lady Macbeth, following her critically celebrated performances in *Hamlet* and *Julius Caesar*.

The stage show closed in the West End a month ago and the cinema release is the **only** way for audiences to see this **record-breaking**, critically acclaimed production, which has been nominated for **six WhatsOnStage awards**.

This is an ideal opportunity for students to experience the text they have been studying in class during the vital revision months. The performance is just under two hours (without an interval) and rated 12A.

## **BFI LONDON Sixth Form trip**

We are delighted to share the success of our recent sixth form trip to the BFI London, where students took part in an engaging and inspiring Black Panther-

themed study day lead by Rob Miller, industry expert and consultant of film and media who develops resources for exam board specifications. This experience offered our students the opportunity to explore the significance of mainstream cinema in the context of Industry and Audience - essential elements of the Media Studies course of study. Students considered how *Black Panther* broke new ground in portraying African culture, identity, and heritage in mainstream media. The day also included a screening of the film, where students could experience the magic of *Black Panther* on the big screen having just discussed its themes, narrative and global impact.

Our students represented the school with maturity, enthusiasm, and a clear passion for learning. They involved themselves in answering questions and responding to real exam questions amongst peers from other schools. This trip not only enriched their understanding of media and film as a tool of storytelling, but it also encouraged meaningful reflections on culture, representation, and the power of film to shape our perspectives.

A huge thank you to the BFI team for hosting such a fantastic event, but most importantly, well done to our sixth formers for making the day so memorable and for showing such a positive attitude throughout.
