Needless to say, seeing it finally come to the stage five years later was an unmissable moment. This show stands out as being one of the best school shows in Turing House history! Every element was on point — the acting, the choreography and the live band playing the catchy tunes of the production. It was all top-notch! Bugsy was played with such flair and charm, a perfect contrast to the nononsense attitude of Blousey. The two rival gang leaders, Fat Sam and Dandy Dan, were spectacular, with Fat Sam's comedic timing being impeccable. Tallulah and all the speakeasy dancers brought fantastic flirtation, especially in scenes with Bugsy and Fizzy, while the rest of the cast delivered sublime performances, generating tons of

laughs.

Having a live band play the show-stopping numbers really transported the audience to a speakeasy, a feeling reinforced from the moment we entered the pre-set foyer before the show.

One of the most entertaining aspects of the show was the splurge guns. They really added humour to the show, especially when targeted at the teachers at the end of the performance! The Performing Arts department have created a musical theatre masterpiece which was completely inclusive, with over 120 students involved backstage, designing the lighting and sound, in the band and of course, performing on stage



Physics trip

A group of 18 Year 12 and Year 13 Physics students visited Geneva with Ms Loudain last week. The main purpose of our trip was to visit the Large Hadron Collider at CERN. We had a guided tour of CMS, one of the four detectors in the 27km loop. To access the restricted areas, we had to wear hard hats and take a lift 100 meters underground! We also did a lab workshop at CERN where we built cloud chambers to detect and observe the particles surrounding us. By the end of the workshop, we were able to identify alpha and beta radiation, as well as muons. We also managed to fit in some sightseeing in the city. We visited the cathedral and two museums. The trip was organised by Mr Bensusan-Bash from Kings School, Hove, and 6 students from Kings School joined us on the trip.



Oxbridge Society

On Monday, our Year 12 MAGT students and members of the Oxbridge Society had a talk with an outreach officer and alumni from Homerton College, University of Cambridge. The talk consisted of information about financing university, the different types of universities in the UK, the collegiate system, future careers, personal statements, the application process and how to prepare for a place at Cambridge.
