
Unity in Diversity Day 2025

Year 12 Geography trip

The summer term kicked off in full force for year 12 geography students who spent three days in the South Downs national park for their fieldtrip. During the trip, students undertook several investigations following the stages of a geographical enquiry. They conducted background research on study locations, planned out data collection methodologies, presented their findings using a variety of techniques and analysed their results. The main foci of study were ecosystems, coastal processes and changing places; we worked long into the evenings but students approached every day with enthusiasm. All of this is an essential part of their A' level where they will complete their independent investigations worth 20% of their final grade. A personal highlight for me was being lucky enough to see a barn owl swooping at dusk by the river in front of the entire group. Not only was the trip essential for them to practise geographical fieldwork, but it also allowed them to see some excellent examples of realworld geography and experience the great British countryside.







Year 9 STEM day

On Thursday last week, a group of students in Year 9, including the MAGT students in the year group, took part in the Blast off to RIAT STEM Day run by the RAF Charitable Trust and the Smallpeice Trust. The morning started off with some theory about forces and the students chose a location to land their rover. They then spent time visiting a 'shop' to buy materials to help build their cup lander. This consisted of lots of time spent using glue guns and craft knives to perfect

their design! Following lunch, the students then engaged in a marketing lesson and finally presentations were held by all the students, explaining and demonstrating their final design.
