Year 8 London Lifesavers


Students in Year 8 had a unique and potentially lifesaving opportunity this week as they took part in a CPR and defibrillator training course delivered by the London Ambulance Service. The interactive sessions, held at school, introduced students to essential emergency response skills that could one day help save a life.

The course focused on teaching the basics of Cardiopulmonary Resuscitation (CPR) and the safe use of an Automated External Defibrillator (AED). Trained paramedics from the London Ambulance Service guided the students through hands-on practice.

The training is part of a broader effort to empower young people with the confidence and knowledge to act in an emergency. With sudden cardiac arrests being a leading cause of death in the UK, early intervention through CPR and defibrillation can make all the difference.

Staff were impressed by the students' enthusiasm and focus during the sessions. The school plans to continue working with the London Ambulance Service in the future to ensure that more students receive this crucial training.







A Level Media Studies

During double A Level Media Studies this Wednesday, our Media Studies students had a fantastic and insightful field trip to Richmond Upon Thames High Street. Linked to their Newspaper topic, students were tasked with uncovering the reality of the decline of print newspaper sales. The learning intention for the students was to research how newspapers are distrusted and circulated in their physical form to readers. Teamed up and brimming with curiosity, they explored local supermarkets and newsagents to uncover the secrets behind how newspapers are sold. From chatting with friendly shopkeepers to noting

delivery times and digging into sales figures, our budding researchers gained real-world knowledge of the newspaper industry. The students came back with genuine enthusiasm—and a few surprising facts! A huge well done to all for their professionalism and teamwork during this exciting hands-on learning adventure.




Annual Geography & Environment Summit

In addition to the workshops, students toured some of Kingston University's state-of-the-art facilities in engineering, environmental science, and geography—an inspiring glimpse into the academic and career paths that may lie ahead.

Year 9 Boys 5-aside Football Tournament


