

Message from Mr O'Sullivan

Year 11 and Year 13 students are now in the full swing of their external examinations. We have all been incredibly impressed with their focused approach. For Year 11 students across the country in particular, it is vitally important to remember that the journey to this point has been less than smooth. Mrs Graco, our former Computing teacher whom some of you will remember, passed on this powerful message about students in Year 11 the other day, that I will share with you:

When the world shut down in March 2020, you were just children in Year 6. You missed your leavers' parties, your final sports days, the transition days that were meant to ease your leap into secondary school. For some, education halted entirely—no online learning, no structure, just uncertainty. You began secondary school not with the usual excitement and nerves, but through screens and restrictions. Your Year 7 wasn't filled with team-building days, school trips, residential adventures and lunch break conversations.

You learned to work in bubbles, to avoid physical contact, to keep your heads down. Interschool sports? Cancelled. Drama productions? Postponed. Group work? Discouraged. Yet here you are. Five years later. About to be



assessed and judged by the same grade boundaries used in a pre-Covid world—as if it's been a level playing field all along.

To every young person in Year 11 sitting their GCSEs this year: you've already overcome one of the greatest disruptions to education in living memory. You are resilient. You are capable. You are more than a number on a results slip. Pace yourselves. Do your best. Be kind to yourselves and each other. In just six weeks, these exams will be over. But your courage, your persistence, and your story—that will stay with you, and with us, for a lifetime.

When Covid hit, Year 13 were in Year 8, Year 10 (who are sitting their GCSE RP next week) were in Year 5. We couldn't be prouder of you all.

Less technology, better attendance

We aim for every student's attendance to be at 96% or above!



We are sure that you are aware of the ongoing discussions across the country, and even within parliament, regarding students and their use of mobile phones. This is an important topic that affects our children's health and academic performance.

Our school attendance team, along with the PLUS team, has been engaging in regular discussions with students. Many of them have shared that they are on their mobile phones until late in the evening. This habit is leading to late bedtimes and poor-quality sleep, which in turn affects their focus and performance in lessons.

To help our students achieve better sleep and improve their focus in school, we encourage parents to take the following steps:

- Limit Screen Time: Set a reasonable limit on the amount of time your child spends on their mobile phone each day.
- Create a Plan: Work with your child to agree on a plan for mobile phone use, including specific times when they should put their phones away.
- No Charging in Bedrooms: Do not allow mobile phones to be charged in bedrooms overnight. This simple step can significantly reduce the temptation to use devices late into the night.

By working together, we can help our students develop healthier habits that will benefit their sleep, focus, and overall well-being.

VE Day

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VE Day, the abbreviation of Victory in Europe Day, is a day commemorating the Victory of WW2 in Europe. In the UK it is commemorated on 8th May, marking Germany's unconditional surrender. Last Thursday the 80th anniversary of VE Day was commemorated. It was an absolute pleasure to visit Turing House this week to run practice interviews with the Sixth Form. Students were asked to prepare for an interview for one of four roles. The one I interviewed for was as a Policy/Public Affairs Researcher for a (fictional) international media company. I asked the students questions that would be typical for a job interview:

- why are you interested in the role?
- what challenges do you think the media industry is currently facing?
- give an example of how you've approached a research project
- give an example of collaboration or teamworking

I was really impressed by the students I met. They were well-prepared, professional, engaged and

welcoming - all really important qualities in the working world.

I was particularly impressed by some of the research projects the students were doing for their EPQs and their interest in current media issues: we talked about equality in sports, freedom of speech, artificial intelligence, immigration policy, Brexit, Trump's tariffs and the longstanding rap feud between Kendrick Lamar and Drake. Such great conversations! Careers support including interview prep is hugely important for building students' confidence so I am really pleased they had this opportunity and would encourage other parents to get involved with the careers programme at Turing House.






Alan the Starling

The growth of a starling chick from hatching to fledging is quite fascinating! I learned this when a colleague needed help in saving one that had fallen from the nest in the eaves and had been consequently abandoned by its parents. I have had "Alan" from about a week-and-a-half old. He has lived in the preproom and demanded mealworms quite loudly when anyone has passed him. By the time this newsletter is published, he will have fledged. He has more than shown his willingness to survive – and I have learned so much about this fascination species of bird. Starling (*Sternus vulgaris*).

- Hatchling: Newly hatched starlings are blind, naked, and completely dependent on their parents for warmth and food.
- Nestling: Within a few days, they start to develop down feathers. Their eyes open, and they begin to grow rapidly.
- 3. **Fledgling**: Around 18-21 days old, they develop flight feathers and start to leave the nest, though they still rely on their parents for food for a short period.
