Key Stage 5



Our Year 13s came to the end of their educational journey at Turing House School with a stellar set of results which were our best ever!

The average grade was an amazing Grade B, with an overall school progress score of 0.50 (unvalidated). This equates to our students on average gaining an additional half a grade of progress from their minimum target grades. These minimum target grades are based on their GCSEs, and we know how well they did in those.

All of the grade boundaries were either above or in line with last year, making it incredibly impressive that 11.7% of grades gained were A*s, 33.1% of grades gained were A* to A, 62.3% of grades gained were A* to B, 87.4% of grades gained were A* to C, and finally 95.4% of grades gained were A* to D. Overall 98.7% of grades were passes for student courses.

Amongst all the success, stand out students for progress were Honor B, Sam W and Richard H, all of whom gained on average a whole two grades better than their targets!

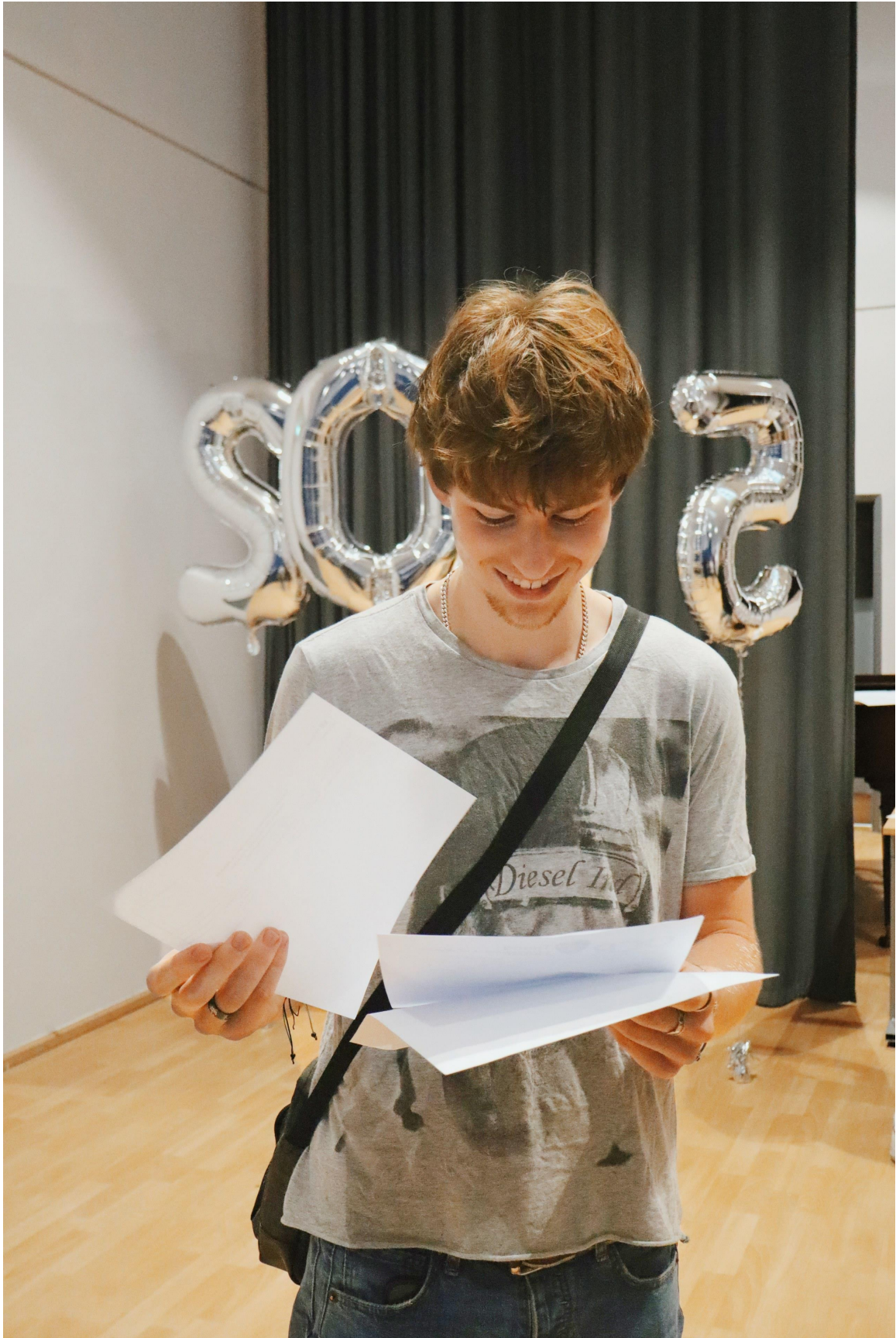
Our top achieving students for A-Level attainment were:

Our Vocational Sports results were also glowing, with 72.7% of the cohort gaining a Distinction or a Distinction Star.

Our students are heading off to a wide range of universities and other progression routes, which you can see some of below.

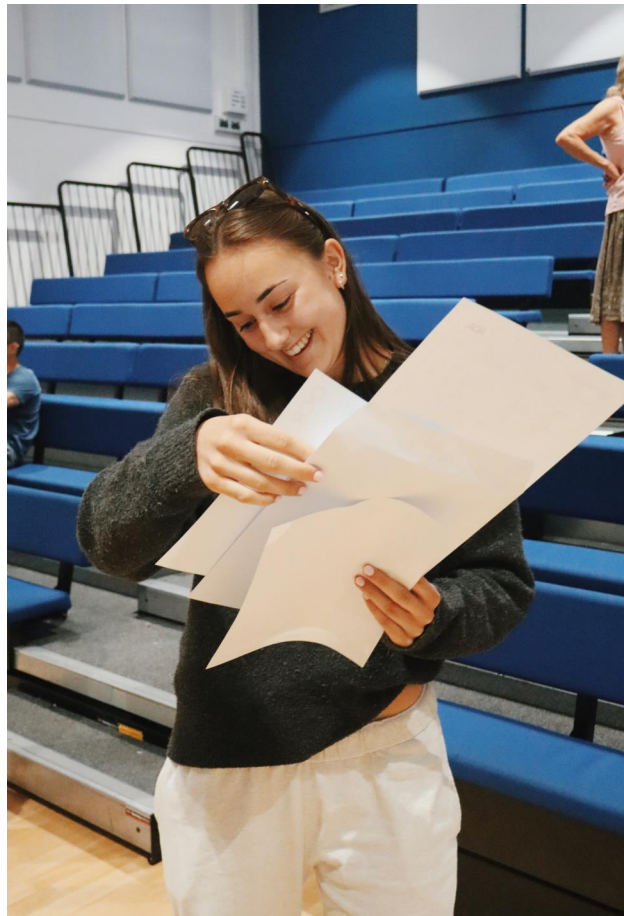
Progression Routes 2025

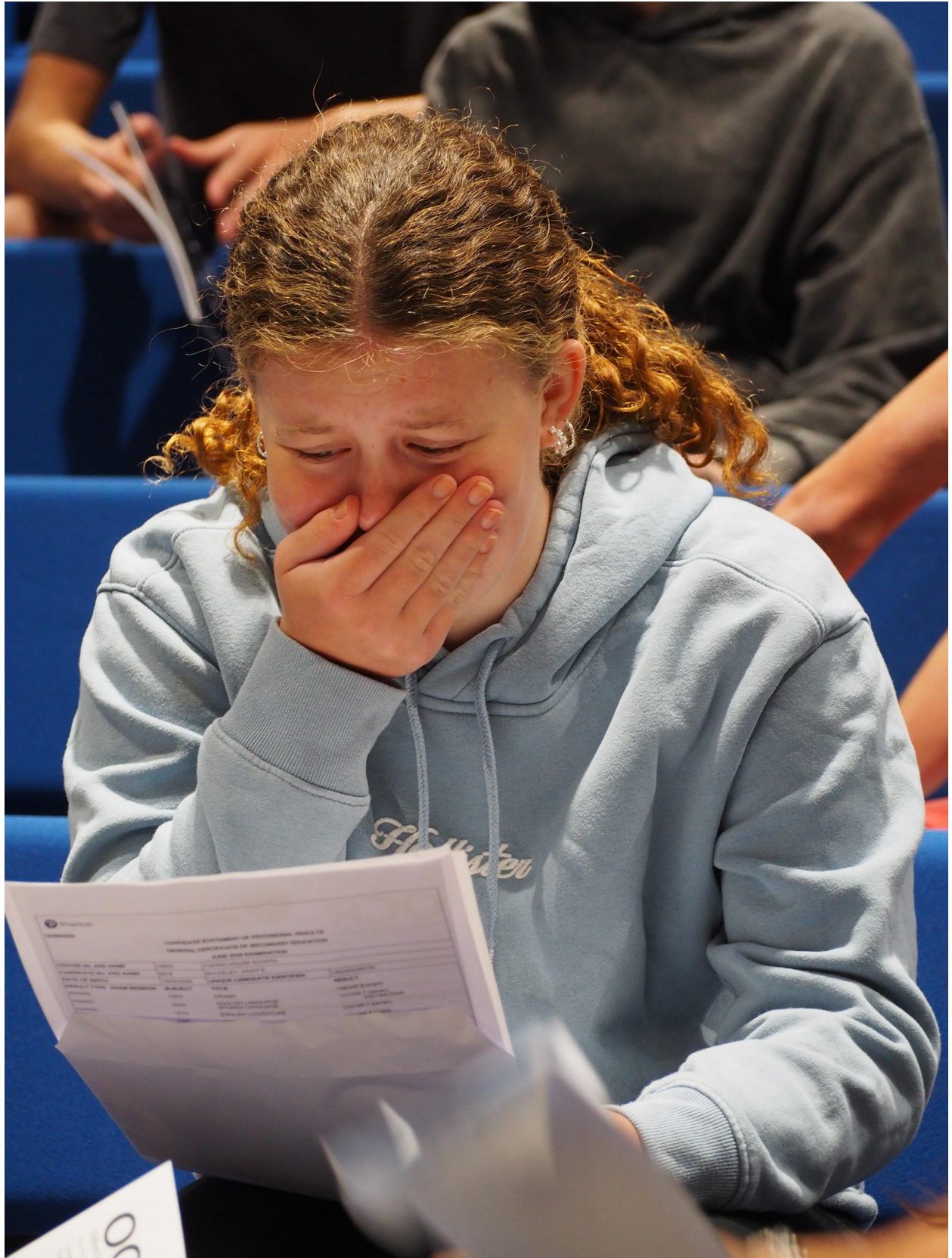








Key Stage 4



What a journey this cohort have been on! From their Covid-disrupted education to some fantastic GCSE results, we couldn't be prouder.

84% of students gained grades 9 to 4, with 73% achieving a strong pass at 9 to 5. 37% of students gained the very top grades at 9 to 7. Whilst progress is not a nationally validated figure this year due to the absence of Year 6 SATS, our internal data shows a progress score of 0.90. This is something that we are incredibly proud of, showing that our students (and staff) have worked incredibly hard. 78% of the cohort gained 5 passes including English and maths, with 63.6% gaining strong passes in this measure.

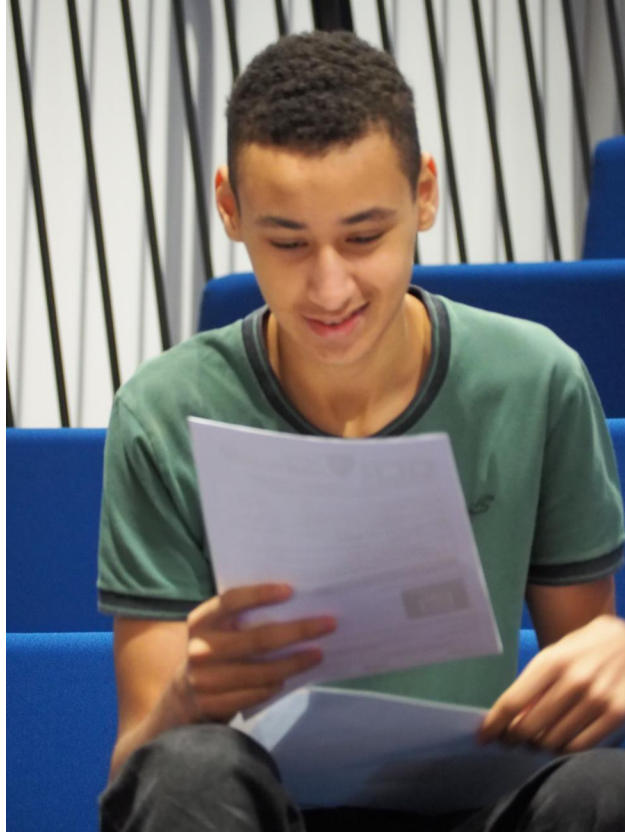

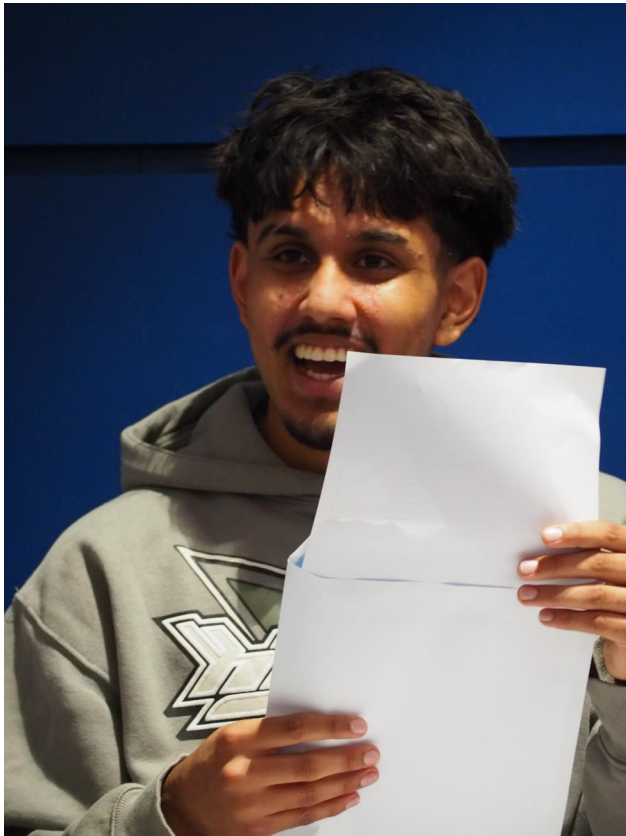
Also, a special commendation must go to Shamsi who averaged a grade 9.

Once again, we were delighted with the achievement of this cohort who take a GCSE short course one year early. Huge thanks to Ms Siddiqui who taught the entire cohort.

159 students were entered with 10% gaining a grade 9. 46% gained the top grades of 9 to 7, with 73% gaining a good pass 9 to 5 and 85% gaining grades 9 to 4.
