

# Message from Mr O'Sullivan 10th October 2025

On Friday our staff came together in a sea of yellow—not for fashion, but for a cause that touches every one of us: mental health. By wearing yellow, we proudly supported the Young Minds "Hello Yellow" initiative, a national movement that shines a light on the importance of young people's mental wellbeing.

This year, we chose a subtle but intentional approach. Only staff wore yellow, creating a visual cue designed to spark curiosity among students. And it worked. Questions were asked. Conversations began. And that's exactly what we hoped for.

Mental health is not always easy to talk about, especially for young people navigating the pressures of school, friendships, identity, and the world around them. But silence can be isolating. By wearing yellow, we sent a message: you are not alone, and it's okay to talk.

Today our Year 11 students took part in a special drop-down session to mark World Mental Health Day. Organised by Senior Prefects Bella and Arohan, the morning offered a range of activities from volleyball and badminton, to creative workshops which promoted wellbeing, connection, and self-care. A huge thank you to all staff who supported the event and helped create a positive, inclusive atmosphere for our students.





At Turing House, we believe that mental health deserves the same attention and care as physical health.

To understand why these conversations matter, we can look to the story of Stephen Fry, a beloved British actor and writer. In 1995, while performing in the play *Cell Mates*, Fry experienced a severe mental health crisis and abruptly left the production. At the time, few understood what had happened. In fact, elements of society turned against him. Fry revealed he had been struggling with bipolar disorder, and the incident marked a turning point in his life.

Rather than retreat, Fry chose to speak openly about his experiences. He became a passionate advocate for mental health, producing documentaries, writing about his journey, and serving as

President of the charity Mind. His courage helped break down stigma and encouraged countless others to seek help and speak up.

At Turing House, we believe that mental health deserves the same attention and care as physical health. Initiatives like Hello Yellow help us build empathy and create a culture where students feel safe to speak up and seek support.

We're proud to stand with Young Minds in their mission to make mental health a priority for every child and young person. Today was just one step—but it was a bright, bold one.

Let's keep the conversation going.

They have learnt how to focus and take the pictures in semi-automatic mode, so far delving into how shutter speed can affect exposure and sharpness of image.


As the club evolves, students will discover all about aperture, white balance, composition and editing techniques within Adobe Lightroom.


The club is led by our LSA, Ms Ansell, who is a professionally trained press photographer.

## Year 8 Trip to Bletchley Park: Cracking Codes & Exploring History

This week, our Year 8 students embarked on a fascinating journey into the heart of wartime codebreaking at Bletchley Park. From the moment they arrived, they were immersed in the rich history and interactive exhibits that brought World War II intelligence work to life.

Students explored the iconic mansion and got hands-on with the exhibits, learning about the incredible efforts of Alan Turing and his colleagues. A highlight of the day was the engaging learning session where students tried their hand at codebreaking using a replica of the Enigma machine - an unforgettable experience that sparked curiosity and admiration for the brilliant minds behind it. The visit also included a powerful screening of the D-Day film, which offered a sobering and impactful look at the realities of war and the crucial role intelligence played in its outcome.

It was an excellent day of learning, reflection, and inspiration. The trip not only deepened students' understanding of WWII but also highlighted the profound impact of mathematics and logic in shaping history. For those interested in learning more, we highly recommend watching *The Imitation Game*, a compelling film that tells the story of Alan Turing and the codebreakers of Bletchley Park.
