'I Wish I'd Known' Workshop for parents and carers



We would like to invite you to a drug and alcohol awareness workshop for parents and caregivers led by the drug education charity the Daniel Spargo-Mabbs Foundation. This will be held on **Thursday 20th November at 6pm** and has been made possible thanks to funding from The Richmond Voluntary Fund.

This session provides an opportunity for you to become more aware of what issues face your children, and what you can do to help them stay safe. You can ask questions before the workshop via the online survey link you will receive, and during the workshop itself.

The event will cover:

- levels of young people's exposure to drugs and alcohol what, where, when and how
- what parents and caregivers need to know about the risks faced by young people when it comes to drugs and alcohol, and the factors that affect the decisions they make
- how to have effective conversations with your child about drugs and alcohol, and practical suggestions for what you can do to support them to stay safe
- how to know and what to do if you have concerns about drug use
- where to go for more information and support.

The DSM Foundation is a drugs and alcohol education charity set up in 2014 by Fiona and Tim Spargo-Mabbs after the tragic death of their 16 year old son Daniel as a result of an accidental overdose of ecstasy. The aim of the charity is to support young people to make safer choices about drugs, which it does through a broad range of workstreams. Turing House OAOA Workshop

The new Year 8 TfL Pioneer Ambassadors for this year were chosen just before the half term break and then we had our second assembly and workshop as a part of Our Air, Our Action — Richmond Council's environmental project. This time it all focused on Green and Healthy Travel. Our year 8s learnt about how the travel sector causes air pollution and is responsible for a high amount of greenhouse gas emissions. They discussed how sustainable travel is very important, and the range of social, environmental and economic benefits it has.

In Richmond borough, transport accounted for 71% of total NOx emissions in tonnes per annum (London Atmospheric Emissions Inventory, 2019), and cars make up 51% of road transport's total NOx emissions (London Atmospheric Emissions Inventory, 2025).

It is so important to think about how you travel to school, meet up with friends, go to different activities and move around the local area. Are you being driven somewhere that you could maybe walk or cycle part of the way?

Small actions make such a huge difference, so we're tasking all pupils, teachers and staff to try and switch one journey a week to a sustainable travel journey. That means leaving the car at home and switching to either walking, cycling, scooting or taking public transport just once a week. We're excited to hear how you all get on!

The second part of this workshop involved our TfL Pioneers analysing a range of data sets and using their own lived experiences to plot and create a map which highlights the best walking, cycling and public transport routes around the area.
