

Message from Mr O'Sullivan 14th November 2025

We are now a term and a bit into the launch of our phone-free school, and with both Anti-Bullying Week and Remembrance falling within this period, it has been a time for reflection. One thing has become very clear: students are more focused on their learning and living in the present.

While students at THS were generally compliant from the start, with only a small minority testing the boundaries, it has been fantastic to hear anecdotal feedback about how this decision has enhanced concentration in lessons and reduced distractions and conflicts outside of them.

I'm sure this analogy won't be lost on the adults reading: phones—and social media—are a lot like driving. Cars give us a sense of shelter and sometimes a false sense of bravery. From behind the wheel, we might shout an expletive or act in ways we wouldn't face-to-face, protected by our metal box. Phones work the same way for children. They provide a layer of distance that can lead to mistakes—such as not understanding the implications of misogynistic, homophobic, or racist language, or even jokes.

By removing phones between 8 a.m. and 3 p.m., we've significantly reduced situations where students fall out over comments made online during breaks or lunch. This means disagreements

remain between individuals rather than escalating across the school—or even the borough—via social media.

With half of the secondary schools in the borough now adopting phone-free expectations, this is a positive step toward supporting the mental health and wellbeing of our young people. As always, all information about Yondr and our phone-free policy can be found here.

Cycling reminder

- Pavements are designated for pedestrians only. Cycling on pavements is not only
 inconsiderate but also illegal in most cases and can put pedestrians, especially younger

- Students who cycle to school must use the road responsibly, adhering to traffic laws and prioritising the safety of all road users. This includes riding at safe speeds and being mindful of pedestrians and other cyclists.
- We encourage all parents to discuss safe cycling habits with their children and to model responsible behaviour.
- The school is actively working to raise awareness of road safety and respectful conduct through assemblies, tutor time discussions, and communications with students.

We appreciate the community's vigilance and support in keeping our school environment safe and welcoming for everyone. Together, we can ensure that walking and cycling to school remain safe, healthy, and enjoyable options for all our students.

A Reflection on Remembrance Day

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Remembrance Day has always provided a moment of solemn reflection for my family. My Great Great Uncle Max died on the 22nd August 1918 in Northen France.

Maximillian Cecil Victor Gumpert was born in 1897, the second eldest of five siblings. We believe his mother died in labour when Max was 12, which must have been a devastating loss for the family. The Gumperts lived at 15 Heathfield South in Twickenham. On the 1911 census, Max is listed as a 'child actor', and we have photographs of him in various roles as he was growing up. His name is on the Drury Lane Theatre roll of honour.



At the outbreak of World War One, Max signed up to fight and was placed in the East Surrey Regiment (the same as playwright R.C. Sheriff). The family story goes that he was underaged when he enlisted but lied about his age and was accepted. We also have his height as being 5ft2, which seems very small for a soldier but that was more common back then!

The East Surrey Regiment is believed to have been involved in the Christmas Day Truce football game, but we will never know if Max took part. We always liked thinking perhaps he did, and was given a day of respite in an otherwise traumatic and terrifying war. Due to the nature of his death, his body was not intact enough to bury, therefore we do not have a grave to visit, but his name is inscribed on the Vis-En-Artois Memorial in France, which we have visited a few times.

Max's name is also engraved on the War Memorial at St Mary's Church in Twickenham. Unfortunately, it he was incorrectly named 'Mark Gumbert'. Max's younger brother, Eric, angry and grief-stricken by the death of his big brother, attempted to correct his name one evening using a chisel. He was caught doing this by police. More recently, we have tried to correct this error on the honour roll in the church, but it has sadly not been possible.



Each year, my family and I remember our Great Uncle Max, the sacrifice he made and the hole that was left in the Gumpert family by his death. My Grandad, who passed away in 2012, was named after him. He told me about these stories, showed me photos and took me around the Imperial War Museum as a child, teaching me about the history of the wars. I believe this is why I became a History teacher. My parents helped to run the Poppy Appeal in Teddington for many years also in Max's memory, and this will be their final year doing so due to them moving out of the area.

If your family has a story to share about either war, and if you are able to provide us with any display items (copies of photos, paperwork, photos of medals, letters, stories) we would love to do a display in the History Department! We remember those who have gone by passing on the story to the next generation, and as we move further in time away from the war, the importance of remembering these tales is ever-important.

I Wish I'd Known Workshop for Parents and Carers



We would like to invite you to a drug and alcohol awareness workshop for parents and caregivers led by the drug education charity the Daniel Spargo-Mabbs Foundation. This will be

held on **Thursday 20th November at 6pm** and has been made possible thanks to funding from The Richmond Voluntary Fund.

This session provides an opportunity for you to become more aware of what issues face your children, and what you can do to help them stay safe. You can ask questions before the workshop via the online survey link you will receive, and during the workshop itself.

The event will cover:

- what parents and caregivers need to know about the risks faced by young people when
 it comes to drugs and alcohol, and the factors that affect the decisions they make
