


Message from Mr O'Sullivan 21st November 2025

Spanish Exchange: A Week of Culture, Learning and Friendship

Last week, we were delighted to welcome 19 students from Spain for an exciting exchange experience. Over the course of the week, our visitors shadowed buddies in years 9, 10, and 11, immersing themselves in school life and British culture.

To capture their impressions, our Work Placement student from St Mary's University - Alice Ingram - interviewed three of the Spanish students - Uxía, Paulo, and Africa - about their time with us and has written about what they had to say!

Firstly, the students found lessons "quite tricky" and noticed a higher academic standard compared to their schools in Spain. They were particularly intrigued by subjects like Drama, History, Art, and Psychology, which aren't part of their usual curriculum. "We wish we could study psychology back home," one student shared.

One of the biggest surprises? Uniforms! In Spain, students wear their own clothes, which they feel makes them more comfortable and focused. While they appreciated the simplicity of not planning outfits, they also felt uniforms limit self-expression. Another difference was lunchtime - Spanish students typically go home for lunch, so eating at school was a new experience. When asked about food, they admitted that for them: "The food is better in Spain!"

Our visitors loved exploring London, calling it "beautiful" and recommending the Natural History Museum as a must-see. They were also hoping to spot deer and foxes during their stay. Coming from northern Spain, they found the weather similar - just a bit hotter back home.

They described the experience as "fun, interesting, joyous, happy, educational and interesting" and said they'd happily stay another week. They were impressed by how supportive and helpful everyone was, and even noted: "Teachers here seem to really enjoy their jobs - more than in Spain."

As the week came to an end, many said they felt "sad to leave." This exchange was not only educational but also a wonderful opportunity to build friendships and share cultures. We're proud of how welcoming our students and staff were - and we look forward to more exchanges in the future!

Turing Teams into National Public Speaking Competition Round 2

"This is a team sport, and no one was left behind," commented the judge responsible for providing feedback to the two history-making Turing House School teams who competed in the ESU's Public Speaking Competition on Tuesday 11th November 2025. History-making for two reasons: firstly, these students are indelibly written into the school's story for being the first to ever represent the school in a nationwide public speaking competition; secondly, for surprising everybody by proceeding into the second round!

July 2025 marked the start of the school's Public Speaking journey with students encouraged to research, write and submit a short speech about a topic of interest. Students who submitted the most compelling speeches were invited to the club's first session in September, alongside other students who expressed an interest in improving their speaking, listening and debating skills. Throughout September, students familiarised themselves with the competition's official roles, timings and format. Then, in October, we received exciting confirmation of the date of round 1 and (perhaps most excitingly) our opponents. From October until early November, students

secured their understanding of the nature of the roles with each team comprised of a Chair, a Speaker and a Questioner. Alongside these roles, a committed group of students supported their teammates during practice sessions by positioning themselves as judges tasked with providing feedback about the strengths and areas for improvement based on the competition's judging sheet. Then, it was time to compete...

Taking place online via Zoom, Turing's two teams were matched against teams from Tiffin Girls' School and Saint Richard Reynolds Catholic College. The nature of the competition means that Chairs and Questioners from one team are paired with a Speaker from a different team. Groups were placed into breakout rooms to introduce one another and to ask questions about selected topics. Topics explored throughout the heat included whether freedom of speech means freedom from consequences (Charlotte), whether an individual can make a change but a team can make a revolution (Kaysan), and whether we are drowning in knowledge or starving for information. Fuelled by adrenaline and pizza, the students waited in anticipation of the judges' verdict...

Prompting joyous scenes of celebration, the judges announced that both Turing teams would advance to the competition's second round to be held in person in January. Our allocated judge emphasised the way in which Turing team members created a warm and friendly atmosphere, interrupted politely, listened actively, and inspired audiences. Whilst Questioner Zoe was praised for the depth and probing nature of her questions, it was the collaborative nature of Turing's teams which secured victory in our debut campaign. Huge congratulations to all of the participating students: Arran T, Khoi M, Felix CH, Florence M, Juliet HW, Dani Z, Charlotte HW, Kaysan C, Kara M, Zoe F, Florence G and Lucas B. The key to our continued success will be teamwork and ensuring that "no one is left behind".

This is a four-week placement where students receive one-to-one careers guidance from trained mentors within leading businesses in London. 
