Candidates must answer ONE of the following questions. Candidates should feel free to focus their terms of its historical period, geographical centre and cultural range.

- How might present day inequalities (for example in income, opportunities, or access to services) be related to colonialism? Discuss with reference to a specific example or examples.
- How do conventions of genre shape narratives about colonialism and its legacies? Discuss with reference to one or two examples of either fictional or historical narratives in any medium (for example literature, art, or film).
- Choose an institution in either the present or the past (for example a political, economic, cultural or legal institution) and discuss how colonialism has influenced its development, and with what consequences.
- 4. Have colonial ideas or systems impacted trust in biomedical research? Discuss with reference to a specific example or examples
