

Message from 4th July 2025

Mr O'Sullivan

As you are fully aware, we will be introducing Yondr pouches at school in September – secure cases in which students will store their mobile phones during the school day. I want to reiterate again why this change is both necessary and timely.

A growing body of research continues to highlight the potentially harmful impact of mobile phone, social media, and video game use on young people's mental health. A recent study, published in the Journal of the American Medical Association and reported in The Guardian, tracked over 4,000 children from age nine over four years. The researchers found that nearly one in three showed signs of addictive use of technology – and these students were twice as likely to experience suicidal thoughts or behaviours by the end of the study.

Crucially, the risk wasn't linked to the number of hours spent online. Instead, it was about how that technology use felt and functioned in the child's life – whether it was compulsive, interfered with daily activities like exercise or schoolwork, or caused distress when removed.

We believe it will help our students concentrate better, connect more with each other, and develop healthier relationships with technology.

The study's lead author, Dr Yunyu Xiao, notes that patterns of use which mirror addiction need to be taken seriously – just limiting screen time may not be enough. And while it's true that technology isn't inherently harmful, when its use becomes compulsive or emotionally distressing, it can have serious consequences for wellbeing.

At school, we want to remove unnecessary distractions and provide a calm, focused learning environment. But more than that, we want to safeguard our students' mental health. The Yondr system gives us a practical and respectful way to do this: students keep possession of their phones, but can't access them during the school day.

We know this is a big change – and one we don't take lightly. But it's a response to real concerns, backed by real evidence. We believe it will help our students concentrate better, connect more with each other, and develop healthier relationships with technology.

If you have not done so, please ensure that you purchase your child's Yondr pouch before we break up. As always, we appreciate your support and partnership as we take this important step together.

The evening was a true celebration of creativity, with all GCSE and A-level students represented, creating a diverse mix of artistic expression.



Less technology, better attendance

We aim for every student's attendance to be at 96% or above!

We are sure that you are aware of the ongoing discussions across the country, and even within parliament, regarding students and their use of mobile phones. This is an important topic that affects our children's health and academic performance.

Our school attendance team, along with the PLUS team, has been engaging in regular discussions with students. Many of them have shared that they are on their mobile phones until late in the evening. This habit is leading to late bedtimes and poor-quality sleep, which in turn affects their focus and performance in lessons.

To help our students achieve better sleep and improve their focus in school, we encourage parents to take the following steps:

- 1. Limit Screen Time: Set a reasonable limit on the amount of time your child spends on their mobile phone each day.
- 2. **Create a Plan:** Work with your child to agree on a plan for mobile phone use, including specific times when they should put their phones away.

3. **No Charging in Bedrooms**: Do not allow mobile phones to be charged in bedrooms overnight. This simple step can significantly reduce the temptation to use devices late into the night.

By working together, we can help our students develop healthier habits that will benefit their sleep, focus, and overall well-being.




Sports fixtures
