#### Environment Trust - Conservation Events

Help conserve nature with the Environment Trust. Two free forthcoming events:

#### Thames Draw-Off: Clean-Up

Sat 14th November. Join the Environment Trust to help clear the Twickenham and Richmond foreshore of litter and rubbish during the annual Thames Draw-Off, which is the annual lowering of the river levels to allow access to lock machinery for maintenance. Wear wellies and bring leather gardening gloves if you have them. Bags and litter pickers provided.

#### Kilmorey Mausoleum: tidying the garden.

Sat 28th November. Kilmorey Mausoleum is a historic monument set in an acre of walled garden which is maintained as a wildlife-friendly site. Work will include trimming overgrown vegetation and removing invasive plants. The Mausoleum itself will not be open, but this is a rare chance to visit an interesting and historic site not normally open to the public. No gardening experience necessary. ### Halloween 2015

A message from Richmond Police and Richmond Council

Halloween will soon be upon us, this year falls on Saturday 31<sup>st</sup> October during the school half term and the final Rugby World Cup 2015 match in Twickenham.

Parents, please speak with your children if they are planning to go out on Halloween night and evenings across the holiday week. Make sure you know where they will be going, who they will be with and what they plan to do!

# Stay safe when trick or treating by following this advice:

- Children should always be escorted by an adult
- Only go to houses where residents are happy to welcome 'trick & treaters'
- Don't knock on doors where there is a 'No Trick or Treat' sign privacy & peace should be respected
- Be visible. Stay in areas that are well lit with street lights take a torch with you just in case
- Make sure children are aware not to enter anyone's house stay on the doorstep
- · Be careful not to frighten vulnerable people, especially the elderly
- Look carefully before crossing the road, it will be busy due to the Rugby World Cup
- Advise children not to behave in a disorderly way, e.g. do not vandalise or throw items like eggs and flour. This can cause a great deal of damage and misery. What's more it can be classed as criminal damage.
