
Christmas Books for Turing House

Literacy Fact – Apostrophes

The three golden rules

1. Use an apostrophe when you leave letters out of two words joined together (a contraction)

- *I'm (I am)*
- You're (you are)

2. Use an apostrophe with -s to show something belongs to someone/thing (for possessives of singular nouns)

- Harold's crayon
- My daughter's First Communion

3. Use an apostrophe without -s to show something belongs to people/things - plural (for possessives of most plural nouns)

- the girls' swing set (the swing set belonging to the girls)
- the students' projects (the projects belonging to the students)

Rotary Shoebox Appeal

This year we are taking part in the Rotary Club Shoe Box Appeal: 'The gift of a shoebox that contains toys, toiletries, educational items or household goods is a drop of happiness to the people of Eastern Europe who live in a world of poverty. For many, it will be the first present that they have ever received and it lets them know that somebody, somewhere cares.'

We hope that all students will all want to take part and when they receive a shoebox they can decide whether to give their box to a baby, a child, a teenager or fill it with household items. The Rotary Club will then collect these boxes before we break for Christmas. There is no need to purchase items, simply fill the boxes with things from home that are surplus to requirements. Some suggestions are:

Baby: This is given to new mothers and can include baby wipes, cotton wool buds, baby shampoo, baby oil, talc powder, bonnet, bootees and mitts, baby grow, knitted matinee coat, small soft toy or plastic rattle. Age up to 12 months.

Child: Toys such as 'Matchbox' type toy cars, small bouncy balls, jigsaws, fluffy toys, dolls, colouring books, felt tip pens, Lego, yoyos, bubble blow, etc. Should indicate if for a boy or girl.

Teenager: Please remember boxes for teenage boys and girls up to the age of 18. Such as: make-up, toiletries, sportswear, scarf, gloves, hat, writing materials, deodorants, comb, mirror, football memorabilia, etc.

Household: Household Goods such as hand soap, toothpaste and brushes, envelopes, letter paper, biro pens, etc. Toys are especially appreciated, since these boxes can be used for birthday gifts. This box is also good for older folk, especially if a warm scarf or a pair of gloves is included.


War Horse

We are delighted to announce that on Monday 22nd February, we will be running a trip to see the stunning, critically acclaimed stage adaptation of Michael Morpurgo's 'War Horse'.

In English currently, we have been reading Morpurgo's poignant, elegiac novel 'Private Peaceful', which is also set during World War I. It is a story of friendship, love and courage, which has allowed us to explore the pressures and hardships faced by the men who bravely fought in the First World War. Being able to see 'War Horse' will be a fitting complement to these studies.

The trip will run in the evening, costing £30 for transport and tickets (seated in the stalls). As enthusiasm was so high, we have currently reserved enough tickets for the entire school to go! However, we will need to confirm places in the next few weeks.

A letter will be going home next week with a reply slip and there will be an option to make payments either online using Tucasi or by cash/cheque; details will be in the letter.
