
Litterati


Assemblies this week introduced Turing House to picking up litter in the digital age! On the face of it, not the most inspiring of topics but with some help from TED talks

Salters' Festival of Chemistry Trip

On Friday the 21st of April, four selected students (Ariana A, Raissa D, Zach N and Lewis Q) were chosen to attend the Salters' Institute Festival of Chemistry at the University of London chemistry department. Two challenges were set, both being judged by teamwork, safety and enthusiasm. The first challenge was set by the Salters Institute and was about finding the main suspect of a murder using chromatography and investigating unknown substances. The second challenge was set by the University of London and the aim was to make a cross disappear off a piece of paper we would mix together two substances (hydrochloric acid and sodium thiosulfate) and therefore they would react, resulting in a colour change which would stop you being able to see the 'X'. After the two challenges we had a lecture by a professor about state changes
