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Battlefield Tour

Earlier this month, Ms Riglin and two Year 10 students (Max R and Ethan H) took part in the First World War Centenary Battlefield Tours programme on a joint History and English Literature trip. This trip was funded by the government to mark 100 years since the end of WW1. Over the weekend we visited many key sites in the war and had different focuses on each day.

On the first day, we visited 5 sites and our focus question for the day was 'how did the First World War affect ordinary people from around the world?' First of all, we visited the Passchendale Memorial Museum.



Here we were in a trench with a dugout experience where we learnt about the 400 miles of continuous trenches, the different uniforms that sides would wear and about the how people used gas as a weapon. After this we visited the Lijssenthoek Cemetery.

Here we were told how every headstone tells a story and that all British soldiers were buried on the battlefield with the same graves to show equality.



When the Germans first invaded Belgium they used rape and violence on some of the population; this was used by the British as propaganda against the Nazis. After the cemetery, we crossed the border into France and visited a Canadian memorial called Vimy Ridge. Here we learnt about the Canadian assault on Vimy Ridge in April 1917 and we explored the battlefield which had much uneven grass due to exploded shells. After Vimy Ridge, we stayed in France to go to the Notre Dame de Lorrette cemetery where we saw the ring of remembrance and managed to locate all 3 of our surnames on the panels. This was a French cemetery which remembered the lives of those who died in the local area – the ring of remembrance contained over 500,000 names. In the evening, we returned back to Ypres for a ceremony of the Last Post at the Menin Gate. As a school, we were very proud for Ethan to be at the heart of the ceremony in the centre of the city by presenting a wreath in front of hundreds of people paying their respects as it is a main attraction in Ypres. This ceremony had local choirs performing and has occurred every night in Ypres since 1918.

The following day, we went to visit sites at the Somme and our focus question was 'how does First World War literature reflect the changing view of war as it progressed?' We visited an Indian memorial called Neuve Chapelle. We learnt how Indian soldiers found it difficult to adapt to the new culture. For example, they struggled to adapt to the weather conditions and 3000 safety pins were issued to make sure uniforms fit their soldiers. In 1918 India was not yet divided, so soldiers from Bangladesh, Pakistan and other countries also fought. After visiting Neuve Chapelle, we visited various battlefields and memorials at the Somme, including Sunken Lane, Mametz Wood and Serre Road Cemetery Number 2 - the inspiration for Wilfred Owen's 'Exposure' and 'The Sentry'. However, the main site we visited was the incredible Thiepval Memorial where we remembered the lives of those unidentified in the Somme and recited poems at sunset.



It was a surreal experience to see this memorial and we will remember this for years to come. On our final day, our focus question was 'is remembrance more or less important 100 years on?' and we visited 3 sites before returning home via Eurotunnel. First of all, we visited Artillery Wood Cemetery which is the resting place of Irish poet, Francis Ledwidge. Here we discussed the role of

the Irish in the war and how those who returned home from fighting for Great Britain were seen as traitors in Ireland as they fought for independence. Then we visited the Lanemark German Cemetery. This was a very

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interesting experience as this cemetery had a completely different feel to the other cemeteries we had visited previously. Here they had over 24,000 soldiers buried in one mass plot and had multiple people buried in one grave. Post WW1, Germans were not allowed to spend much time here. Before we headed home, we made one more stop at the Tyne Cot Cemetery where we were given the task to locate a local soldier. After a while searching, we managed to locate the memorial to a man called Percy Frank Appleby. He died aged 20 in 1918 and he lived at 10 Fairfax Road in Teddington. You can also find his name on the Teddington Memorial next door to our school. After locating Percy Frank Appleby, we headed home.

This trip has changed our perspective on the First World War and the experiences we had will never be forgotten. Max & Ethan
