




Football Trials

Parallel Maths Project



Summer planning update

It has been a while since we updated you on the progress of our planning application for our new home on Hospital Bridge Road.

Shortly before Easter our project team submitted detailed responses to all the relevant issues and concerns that people have raised about the plans, including those raised by the Greater London Authority. These documents are currently being reviewed by Richmond Council officers.

In the meantime, our planning consultants have been meeting with Transport for London to discuss the financial contributions that will be made by Government towards extending local bus services and improving transport infrastructure. Richmond Council have not yet allocated a date for our application to be heard by the Planning Committee. Contingency planning with the DfE is underway, to enable us to remain in our temporary accommodation for longer, and this of course includes provision for our 6th Form.

I'd like to reassure you now that plans are already in place for our 6th form to open in 2020 and run on the Teddington site until the new building is ready. Alterations will be made to the Teddington building to allow for specialist 6th form provision e.g. private study areas and a 6th form common room with refreshment facilities. A full range of A-levels and vocational courses will be on offer. Taster lessons will be offered to Year 10 in June at our upcoming 'Sixth Former for a Day' event. More details about this will be coming soon in a letter specifically for Year 10 families, and 6th form was the subject of a special Y10 assembly delivered this week, where students received more information.

As soon as we receive a firm date for the planning meeting we will come back to you. In the meantime, thank you for your continued patience and support!


Ramadan

We would like to wish our Islamic students the very best during the month of Ramadan which begins on Monday 5th May and ends in the evening of Tuesday 4th June. During this period, these students will not eat or drink between the hours of sunrise and sunset. With long days and hot weather, this will be incredibly challenging for them. We will be speaking with the students to find out their intentions with regard to their particular needs. Please note that in accordance with ACSL guidelines, we will follow the following guidance in which a school has a duty to safeguard a pupil's wellbeing. If the school notices signs of dehydration or exhaustion, then it advises the school to ask the pupil if they are fasting, and advise them to terminate the fast

immediately by drinking some water. Islamic rulings would allow the pupil to break their fast and make it up later. The guidance adds that the school should "apply judgment and common sense on a case-by-case basis". Ramadan is the ninth month of the Islamic calendar, and a time when Muslims across the world will fast during the hours of daylight. Ramadan is the fourth of the five pillars of Islam. The Qur'an was first revealed to the Prophet Muhammad during this month. The actual night that the Qur'an was revealed is a night known as Lailut ulQadr ('The Night of Power'). The end of Ramadan is marked by a big celebration called 'Eid-ul-Fitr', the Festival of the Breaking of the Fast. Muslims are not only celebrating the end of fasting, but thanking Allah for the help and strength that he gave them throughout the previous month to help them practise self-control. The festival begins when the first sight of the new moon is seen in the sky.

Pass on Plastic

15 of our Year 7 pupils went to have their photos taken for the papers and gave radio interviews for a campaign against plastic pollution. Along with schools across the Richmond borough, students in each year group wrote letters that will be delivered to parliament on the 8th of May, marking the 93rd birthday of Sir David Attenborough who is a supporter and figurehead for the campaign.
