Saturday 20 March 7-9pm (ticket sales close on 17 March)


Tickets cost £8.50 (£7.50 + £1 booking fee) per device used.

Sherlock Holmes is a fantastic web-based game you can play at home, solo or with your family. It includes audio and visual files that are gradually unlocked as you solve



Did you know.....?


Due to its softness and resilience, animal intestine, mainly from sheep, cow or goat, used to be the most commonly used material to make the strings on a tennis racket.
