Yesterday (22nd April) was Earth Day. Earth Day is an annual event celebrated on 22nd April each year dedicated to awareness about the various environmental challenges that face our planet and Earth Day 2021 will mark the 50th anniversary of the world's largest civic event.

The event is co-ordinated globally by EARTHDAY.ORG and 193 countries around the world have their own version of celebrations.

The first Earth Day, held in 1970, saw millions of people around the world take to the streets with the desire to make a stand for environmental change after the Santa Barbara oil spill in 1969. Many think of this as being the beginning of modern environmental activism.

President Joe Biden has invited 40 world leaders to a virtual climate summit on Earth Day this year to discuss

the action that needs to be taken in order to protect our planet.

Student Forum: Choosing a University



Positive News from a Sixth Former

This week, one of our Lead Students — Harriet — highlights the outcome of the controversial trial of Derek Chauvin.

A significant victory occurred this week in Minneapolis with the conviction of Derek Chauvin, the former police officer responsible for murder of George Floyd on the 25th May 2020. In this historic case, Chauvin was found guilty on all three charges: second degree murder, third degree murder and second-degree manslaughter.

This guilty verdict is only the first step in breaking through a long history of systemic racism in America and taking the accountability for the inhumane treatment of black Americans, serving the justice that George Floyd deserved. It's essential that we recognise in the UK we need to take responsibility for the issues embedded within our society and work towards addressing them in a proactive way as a unified community.

As a result of this conviction, we hope that all cases of police brutality begin to be regarded with the severity that they should and will be dealt with in a just and fair way.
